
INTRODUCTION.



This design statement has been prepared for the proposed development of the plot to the south east of Lower Hall Farm, accessed off Lascelles Hall Road, to develop the site for a one bespoke 1.5 storey home.

This statement has been prepared using a combination of site information, topographical survey and pre-application information.





We were commissioned by one of our existing clients to create a scheme that took advantage of a site in a prominent position on hopton hill. The site has far reaching views accross the valley.

The challenges with the site was it's topography and it's position in relation to neighbouring properties. The site had a steep slope from left to right which needed to be absored into the design. We wanted to create three dwellings that would all be unique and individual with the traditional open gable frontage steeping down the hillside.
